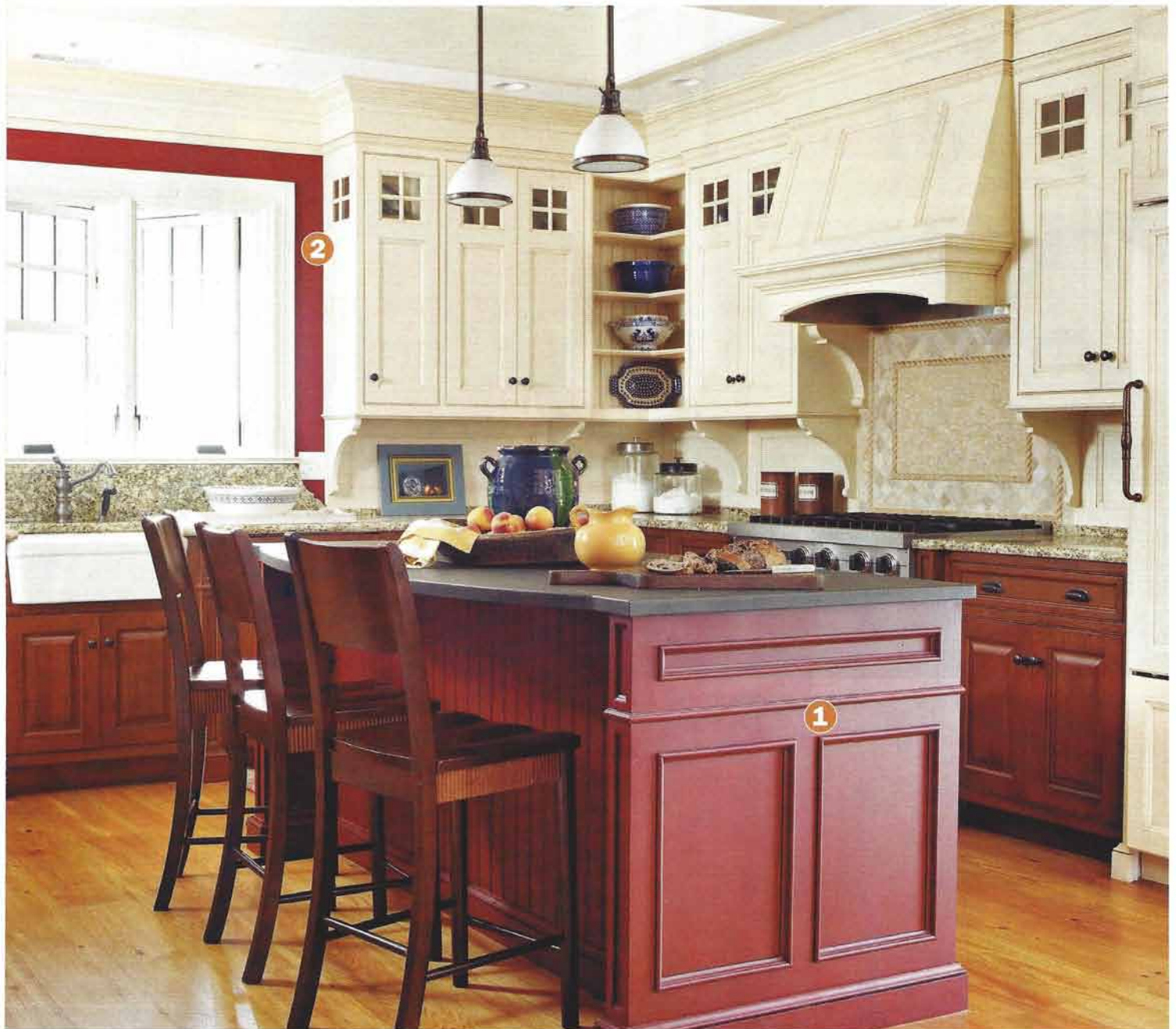


## 10 things to love about this kitchen

#### SEEING RED

Creamy wall cabinets and rich cherry wood on the base cabinetry complement the red and black accents found on the island and throughout the kitchen.

#### SQUARE OFF

Square glass inserts on the wall cabinets provide visual relief without revealing what's behind closed doors. The grid also echoes the six-over-one casement windows at the sink.

### GO CUSTOM

A custom range hood with detailed millwork tops a backsplash of Jerusalem Gold and Jerusalem Pearl marble tile. The roped tile frame pays homage to the home's nautical location.

### STOW BELOW

Opting for a cooktop rather than a range opened space below for two deep drawers that keep pots, pans, and lids organized and within easy reach.



### GET CLEVER

Frigid weather shut down this unheated Connecticut home in the winter. But a new heating and cooling system with ductwork tucked in the soffits makes the cottage a desirable destination all year.

### WORK ON THE SIDE

A built-in refrigerator shares a wall with a message board installed in the kitchen's entryway—a convenient location for updating the grocery list and pinning recipes.



**GET RICH**

Cottage red cabinetry and a brushed Absolute Black granite countertop distinguish the island from the materials used on the perimeter of the kitchen.

**ENJOY THE VIEW**

A serene scene through the stretch of windows makes dish washing and meal prep feel less like chores. St. Cecilia granite adds visual texture while also hiding the occasional crumb or spill.

**HONOR THE PAST**

This may be a new kitchen, but the home itself was built in 1890. A farmhouse sink serves as a stylish reminder of the home's history and provides crisp contrast with the color scheme.

**SHOW IT OFF**

A built-in hutch with furniturelike details displays the homeowners' collection of Polish pottery. The closed storage below houses table linens near the adjacent banquette.
